BOARD AND COMMITTEE RECAPS

Board of Selectmen

- A pinning ceremony was held for new Firefighter, Matthew Thayer. Congratulations and welcome aboard!
- Sgt. Mark Foley, a Swansea resident, was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. Sgt. Foley is a 25 year veteran of the Swansea Police Department and has been a sergeant since July of 2012. He is a firearms and use of force instructor, serves as one of the department's firearms licensing officers, is currently the court liaison, and will be assigned as commander of operations.
- Monitoring Emergency Shelter situation; Task Force of relevant departments established.
- Solid Waste fees to be set at October 3rd meeting..
- Improvements to sidewalks on Bark St, south of Stevens Rd, commenced in early August and will be followed by repaving of the road in October. The engineering phase was just completed and the \$400,000 construction phase is funded through MassDOT's Complete Streets Grant program. Swansea was accepted into the Complete Streets Program in 2021.



Swansea Public Schools Update

The opening of the 23-24 school year has gone well so far, despite some hot days and a few bussing issues. Fall sports are well underway and our teams are being competitive in their divisions! Case High Drama will have their first production, URINETOWN commencing the weekend of October 13. The Case High School Marching Band will be competing at the National level in November and we wish them well in their endeavors. We have welcomed our preschool students and Kindergarteners to our Cardinal family and they are excited to partake in the great learning opportunities that we provide at the early childhood level! Our school's open houses have taken place which allowed caregivers to see all of the great things happening within our classrooms.



Swansea Public Schools is entering the feasibility study phase of our proposed school expansion project. The schools will be requesting \$2 million dollars in funding in order to complete the mandated process and move us toward the next big step of school expansion. This request will be on the Special Town Meeting agenda on November 6. Townspeople should know that the funds need to be allocated and then the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) provides reimbursement of approximately 54.7% of the total funding. This is significant in that the total cost to the town will be approximately \$900,000. The feasibility study will yield an Operation Program Manager (OPM), a Schematic Design firm and an architect so that at the end of the feasibility study period, we will know what the school will look like, where it will be located, how much it will cost, as well as, a timeline for completion of the project. Support for the feasibility study phase is crucial in order for us to take the next steps in building a new school. More information will be shared by the School Building Committee in public forums as we move through the process.

We look forward to continued collaboration with all town entities as we move through this school year and beyond!

RECIPE OF THE MONTH-Beef Stew

Ingredients

- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 pounds cubed beef stew meat
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 4 cups water
- 2 cups beef broth
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

- 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 4 cups cubed local potatoes
- 2 cups chopped carrots
- 1 teaspoon dried rosemary
- 1 cup fresh corn kernels
- 1 cup fresh green beans, cut into 1 inch pieces
- 1 cup chopped turnip (optional)
- 2 cups chopped fresh tomatoes (optional)

Directions

Heat oil in large pot. Add beef and flour, stirring to coat beef. Brown. Add water, broth, salt, and pepper. Heat to boiling, reduce heat, and simmer 1 hour. Stir in potatoes, carrots, and rosemary; Simmer 1-2 hours. Add corn, green beans, and simmer for 30 minutes longer.

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT

MEDEIROS FARM: Final concepts, based on public input, were provided, which show a variety of active recreational uses such as soccer fields, a basketball court, playground, skate park, dek hockey rink, disc golf course, bandstand, bocce, gaga pit, seasonal ice rink, pickleball courts, and a walking trails. The State has provided \$750,000 for construction and the Swansea-Somerset Youth Soccer League will be providing funding for the soccer fields. Additional funds will be sought as the project progresses for the various proposed amenities from State grants. Construction plans will be created next with an anticipated fall commencement.




WATER QUALITY MONITORING PROJECT: The Town is partnering with UMass Dartmouth's



Coastal System Program, School for Marine Science and Technology (SMAST) on a citizen-based volunteer water quality monitoring of the Cole River and Lee River Estuaries, as they are listed as impaired by DEP to excessive nitrogen. SMAST will provide training and testing of samples and the Harbor Advisory Committee has provided the vessels, operators, and volunteers to collect the samples. Year one samples were collected this summer and will continue over the next two summers. Implementation items to address the water quality will be recommended by SMAST.

HARBOR PLAN: The Town received an \$80,000 grant from the State's Seaport Economic Council to draft a Harbor Plan, which will outline waterways policies to ensure all users and uses are effectively managed. A Plan for Swansea's waterways is paramount for protecting and enhancing our water resources, whether they be our rivers or coves. The Plan will contain a vision for our waterways, goals in line with that vision, and implementation measures to realize those goals. These will all be developed through a broad array of stakeholders including representatives of the various water-based clubs utilizing our rivers and coves, members of the Town's Beach Committee and Conservation Commission, the Harbormaster/Shellfish Warden, State agencies involved with waterways regulations, conservation-minded non-profits and members of the public. After development of the stakeholders group, an existing conditions inventory will be conducted followed by a public outreach effort. The establishment of a vision and set of goals will be followed by an action-item list that will ultimately be reviewed by the Planning Board and brought before the Board of Selectmen for approval. Upon approval, this Plan will be utilized as the basis for water-related policy decisions, bylaw and regulation amendments, and possible capital expenditures.

PROJECT SPOTLIGHT



SOWAMS AREA HERITAGE PROJECT: The Sowams Heritage Area Project is undertaking an initiative to develop a National Heritage Area (NHA) in Sowams, the ancestral homeland of the Massasoit Ousamequin who welcomed the Pilgrims in 1621. The project is led by a regional coalition of town planners, tourism entities, historical societies, environmentalists, Tribal leaders, and other volunteers from the nine towns and cities that today comprise Sowams, along the northeastern shore of Narragansett Bay. NHAs protect and promote a region's history, heritage and culture and use those assets to advance local economies through tourism, recreation and community development.

Upcoming Community Conversations about the project will be held on Tuesday, October 17th at 3:00pm at the First Congregational Church (The White Church) on Rt. 6 and Hope and Main in Warren, RI on Wednesday, October 18th at 7:00pm

MEDICARE OPEN ENROLLMENT OCTOBER 15—DECEMBER 7

Medicare Open Enrollment begins October 15th and runs through December 7th with new coverage beginning on January 1st, 2024! Prepare to be flooded with mail, e-mail, telephone calls and television advertisements, all designed to persuade you to

join their plan. All seek to connect you to a "licensed insurance agent" who is NOT affiliated with Medicare and may NOT provide you with unbiased advice. Not all plans are created equal and plans can change from year to year. Even if you're happy with your existing Medicare Advantage plan or your Medicare Part D drug plan, you should know that these plans contract with Medicare for ONE year. Each year, they're allowed to make changes to their coverage. They may change their premiums, deductibles or co-pays. Drug plans may even change their formulary—a drug covered by the plan, may NOT be covered next year. Swansea COA Independent Medicare Insurance counselors are available to help you understand your plan and review other options you may have. Appointments fill quickly. In order for us to provide you with assistance, a Part D drug form MUST be completed and returned to us before appointments can be scheduled to allow us to complete the necessary work prior your appointment. You will also need to create a MyMedicare.gov account (MMA). the Highway Department and the COA staff for all their efforts toward making this such a huge success!


DUNKIN' DONATION

Hurricane warnings indicate sustained winds that are at least 74 MPH are expected to affect a specific area within 24 hours of the warning


HOW DO I STAY SAFE DURING A HURRICANE?

- Avoid driving or going outdoors
- If you must leave your home, do not walk through flowing water or drive through flooded roads
- Stay updated with emergency information from the media
- Evacuate immediately if you are advised to do so
- If you evacuate, BRING YOUR PETS
- If you are told to shelter in place,
 - Stay inside and away from windows
 - Listen to local TV/radio for updates
 - Be prepared to evacuate if weather conditions worsen

His duties will also include sustaining a diverse workforce committed to quality public service, diversity/equal opportunity, benefits, and civil service. When asked by the BOS why he chose public service over the private sector, Mr. Viarella said "the difference in working with a municipality is the work matters more, ultimately affects the people that live, work, and do business in the town which you represent and has a better feeling to it."

The Town would also like to welcome new Deputy Tax Assessor Jim Sullivan. Jim enters this new position with a wealth of experience in the field of both residential and commercial appraising.
